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

Pre-Start Reviews & ASHRAE

Industrial facilities in Ontario must comply with the Occupational Health and Safety Act (OHSA) and many regulations, in particular Reg 851 for Industrial Establishments. Up until 1997, drawings for new and updated facilities were submitted to the Ministry of Labour (MOL) for review. This was a slow inefficient process. As a result, Section 7 of Reg 851 was amended in 1997 requiring a Pre-Development Review (PDR) be done when equipment was constructed or altered and hazardous substances were present or guarding would be required.

The scope in the PDR was so broad that reviews were difficult to do. Hatch did some of these PDRs. They involved complex investigations. The engineering community in Ontario was unhappy with this process and registered many concerns.

In October 2000, Section 7 was again amended, this time requiring a Pre-start Health and Safety Review (PSR) be done by a professional engineer when a new or modified process involved any of 8 specific circumstances – flammable liquids; safeguarding devices; rack or stacking structures; risk of ignition or explosion; dust collectors; molten material; lifting devices; and a change in occupational exposure. A written report listing any deficiencies must be completed prior to start up of the process.

To help with the review and report, the MOL and the PEO produced PSR Guidelines. For the past three years, some industries have been active in completing PSRs for their updated facilities, but many are still unaware of their obligations under the amended Section 7 of Industrial Reg 851.

ASHRAE and its members are affected by Circumstance 8 – does the new upgrade cause a change in the occupational environment? In almost every PSR, the answer is yes, hence a recommendation is included to cover this aspect. Usually more HVAC or extraction equipment is needed to be in compliance. You also need to be aware of the lowering of occupational limits on many agents – solvents, copper, fibre, etc as this also may contribute to the need for more ventilation or extraction. Make sure your clients know about Reg 851 and the new Section 7 and the need to ensure exposure limits in any new or modified facilities are designed to be below the exposure limits.

If You Missed Last Meeting, You Missed This ...

Mr. Terry Hoffmann, Global Products Marketing Manger for Johnson Controls Inc, Milwaukee WI reviewed the issues with "Interoperability" of control systems and devices to the Hamilton Chapter of ASHRAE on February 11,2003.

His presentation reviewed the issues involved in properly specifying BACnet,Lon and integrator applications and the need to focus first on properly specifying the required sequences to provide the client with the end results they are seeking. In addition Mr. Hoffmann pointed out the need to insure that those devices controlled by or interfaced to the control system actually have the proper protocols in place and are "certified" to prevent future interfacing problems. Mr. Hoffmann also reviewed the growing need to have the facility control system interface with a wide variety of data users and the requirement to be able to automatically organize this data in a timely manner and in the formats that the users require. He speculates that there will be a greater use of WEB based services in the future to allow more user flexibility.

Message From The Editor

I don't know how I became infected but I noticed increasingly erratic behavior of some of my programs over the past month. I had McAfee antivirus software installed on my system but had not updated the virus database in a while so it was partially my own fault. I'll have to blame McAfee as well because their automatic virus updating procedure never worked.

I used this opportunity to switch to FSecure's virus detection program. I had a good experience with their product years ago when I first started using the internet and downloaded the latest version of FSecure. After I reinstalled my operating system and programs, I used FSecure to clean out the last remnants of Nimda from my system. It appears that I am "clean" now. As I mentioned, I am not sure when my system was infected but it is possible that this occurred before I sent out last month's Airways so I hope I have not passed this on to you. This virus can attach itself to emails but from my understanding, it would do so by attaching an executable file that the email recipient would have to run to become infected. As far as I know, pdf files (like the one which contains the newsletter) cannot spread this virus.

If you would like to know more about this, or any other computer virus, have a look at www.f-secure.com. And if you need a good anti-virus program, I recommend FSecure. It is easy to install and use and you can download and try it for free for a month (25 MB file), after which time it costs \$60, presumably \$US.
